### Why we celebrate Sea Sunday 14th July 2024.

When a ship comes into port, you might think that seafarers would be queuing at the gangway: impatient to stretch their legs and explore the local town. That might be true for some, but for most, the pressure of work means there is little time for such luxuries. Even if there is time, many seafarers choose to remain on their ships. I remember doing exactly that. You arrive in a port, think you ought to go ashore, but somehow you never get round to it. Life on a ship is different. You develop a different way of living, sleeping and socialising. Sometimes it is easier to stay with the familiar than enter the hustle and bustle of shore life. Nothing wrong with that, but eventually, it can lead to isolation and loneliness. I'm sure many people ashore who live alone can identify with that. Sometimes it's easier just to stay in than risk going out and not meeting anyone.

I loved being a seafarer, but it can take its toll. In Matthew 25, Jesus talks about how a visit from someone who cares can bring light and peace. That's why we at Mission to Seafarers visit ships. We care, and we want to show the love of Jesus to seafarers – no matter who they are.

Our Sea Sunday theme is Psalm 107. The Psalm not only reminds us that God looks after seafarers, but also that they see things that we don't: "They saw the works of the Lord, His wonderful deeds in the deep."

Seafarers don't just bring us goods and cargo; they see God's world in a raw and powerful way that we can learn from. When we visit a ship, we do God's work by showing love and compassion. In return, we are changed by entering their world. Everyone benefits when God's work is done, and He in turn is worshipped. Kindest regards.



### **SHIRENEWTON COMMUNITY COUNCIL**

Extracts from the minutes of the monthly meeting held on 3rd June 2024.

### Planning applications considered

**DM/2024/00626** - 1<sup>st</sup> floor bedroom extension at Beech Grove, Argoed Road, Earlswood

Beech Grove is a 4 bed detached house with a double-garage. The proposal is to link the first floor to an additional bedroom to be formed in the roof of the garage, with its en suite in the link at first floor level. Although not shown in detail there would also be a link at ground level presumably to enable covered access to the garage. The link is fully glazed to the north west elevation

The applicant adds that he had consent under ref M11119 in 2004/5 which has lapsed. The present application is a repeat. No detail of finish or materials is given. The 2005 planning consent stipulated that the materials and finishes of the walls and roofs should be the same as existing. The record also shows consents in 2002 and 2003 for a first floor extension to add bedrooms and for the double garage.

**Recommendation:** No objection and a request to MCC to add the previous condition regarding materials and finishes, was unanimously agreed by Cllrs.

**DM/2024/00643** - Dormer conversion with ground & first floor extension &

**DM/2024/00643** - Front dormers removed from proposed plans, and replaced with roof lights at Willowbrae, 8 Orchard Rise, Shirenewton, NP16 6AY

Willowbrae sits at the top end of Orchard Rise. It comprises a 1½ storey detached house providing 2 bedrooms in the loft and a further bedroom on the ground floor. The proposal is to

extend the kitchen diner outwards at the rear with a further bedroom over. This will require a gable from the existing roof. The ridge line of the gable appears slightly lower than that of the main roof. The new bedroom has a wide balcony overlooking the garden and field beyond.

The additional floor area provided is not totaled up but at some 120 m2 against 102 m2 appears not to exceed an additional 30% of the existing floorspace. Materials and colours are not given in detail, stating only there will be slate tiles, white render and composite cladding.

Councillors wished requesting clarification of the materials and colours or a condition requiring these to be the same as existing.

**Recommendation:** No objection to both was unanimously agreed by Cllrs.

**DM/2024/00651** Resurfacing of an existing forestry car park with EcoGrid permeable ground reinforcement plastic grids - 500M South from the 3-way junction at Pen-y-cae-mawr

Councillors may know of this car park by the top of road up from Parc Seymour through Wentwood Forest. The surface is rough and partly overgrown though in regular use by forest walkers.

The Ecogrid system comprises 33cm square blocks of recycled polyethylene. Councillors may wish to consider whether the car park is in need of extension as it can be full at popular times.

**Recommendation:** No objection and a comment 'can a better non plastic biodegradable, environmentally friendly alternative/ solution be sought' was unanimously agreed by Cllrs.

**DM/2024/00390** Retention and completion of boundary wall/fence at Hillside House Usk Road

Councillors will recall this retrospective application for the block wall alongside the Usk Road. SCC had no objection, provided the colouring of the proposed boarding blends with the surrounding countryside. Highways had no objection as the wall is not constructed on any part of the highway.

An amended plan changes propose boarding to the wall from 225mm stained boards with 100mm gaps to 50mm stained boards with 10mm gaps.

Whilst the applicant proposes a crevice bat box on the west side of the property and a swift nesting cup of woodcrete construction on the east, along with new low level low wattage external lights on a PIR timed switch The MCC biodiversity officer notes originally there had been a hedge and possibly a tree or two and thus recommends replacement planting and/or boxes suitable for use by common garden bird species, with locations of planting/boxes shown on a plan.

**Recommendation:** No objection and the recommendation of the biodiversity officer should be included as a condition was unanimously agreed by Cllrs.

Councilor Vacancy – there is 1 vacancy currently advertised on the website & noticeboards.

Church Clock update: Smiths reported they are unable to do a like for like replacement of the clock. Communication has been received from PCC, and consultation with the community needs to be considered.

Trampoline Park drainage update – MCC have confirmed they will attend after they have completed their current installation

Audit Notice of Electors rights – Approved for display on website and notice boards.

### **20mph Consultation**

### The Head of Highways has indicated as follows (in quote marks and italics):

"If residents want to contact Monmouthshire County Council regarding the Welsh Government announcement (WG Press Release) that they will be revising the guidance on which local roads can be made exempt from 20mph they can do so here <a href="https://www.monmouthshire.gov.uk/welsh-governments-default-20mph-speed-limit/">https://www.monmouthshire.gov.uk/welsh-governments-default-20mph-speed-limit/</a> Welsh Government are keen to hear from residents which streets they think should be reverted back to 30mph.

We need residents to submit their suggestions (along with valid reasons) for why a road should be made exempt from the 20mph national speed limit in Wales via an online form which we have developed, this can be accessed via this link <a href="https://www.monmouthshire.gov.uk/welsh-governments-default-20mph-speed-limit">https://www.monmouthshire.gov.uk/welsh-governments-default-20mph-speed-limit</a>

We will log their feedback and review it once the new exceptions guidance is available from the Welsh Government. We expect to receive this guidance by the summer. Current guidance on setting exceptions to the 20mph speed limit can be found here <a href="https://www.gov.wales/setting-exceptions-20mph-default-speed-limit-restricted-roads-html">https://www.gov.wales/setting-exceptions-20mph-default-speed-limit-restricted-roads-html</a>

If their feedback/suggestion relates to a Trunk Road, these are not the responsibility of Local Authorities, they can email <u>Trunk-Roads20mph@gov.wales</u> More information on Trunk Roads is available on Datamap Wales.

We won't be logging any general comments about the 20mph National Policy, as this is a matter for the Welsh Government and Welsh Government Ministers.

To ensure the team are not diverted from our main priority, keeping our highways safe, we will not be providing individual responses to 20mph enquiries."

### **Local Note on 20mph Consultation**

In our area, 20mph zones were made in the villages of Mathern, Pwllmeyric, Shirenewton and Mynyddbach in the Shirenewton Ward, which were supported by the local residents. The 30mph on the Pwllmeyric Hill is not listed as part of the exceptions to the 20mph default speed limit as it was made by a separate traffic order and is therefore not part of this W review at a local authority level of 20mph default speed limits. It is useful to note that the 20mph on the A48 into Chepstow town from the High Beech roundabout is a trunk road. Any comments on trunk roads should be sent by email to TrunkRoads20mph@gov.wales

### **Gardening Corner**

We took a well-earned rest a few weeks ago. We decided to take a day off and, like all good 'busmen's holidays' went to visit a garden that I have been wanting to visit for some considerable time. This once belonged to Margery Fish and is situated at East Lambrook Manor in Somerset. Having decided that war was on the way, Margery, and her husband Walter decided it was time to move away from London, knowing what might be ahead. They still had to be able to travel back to London, as they both worked within Government circles. Instead of buying a well-established home and garden, they ended up buying a dilapidated house and barn, along with a large heap of manure (very handy I have to add!), as well as other farm buildings and a concrete yard. They gradually started to change things, creating a garden that today, is one of the only, if not the only, garden to be Grade I listed in the country. As with most partnerships, the pair did not always see 'eye to eye'! Walter loved dahlias, the brighter the better, which Margery likened to brash circus clowns', whilst Margery loved a cottage garden, much more subtle and understated. Walter was not impressed. They started with a mixture of both, but Margery was secretly pleased, if the dahlias didn't make it though the Winter hibernation! Walter died not many years after the war ended, so Margery changed things more to her liking, although for the love of Walter, she continued to grow some of the hardier dahlias, which were left in the ground to shoot the following year. Margery died in the 1990's and the house and garden have changed ownership several times. The current owner has done a lot to bring it back to what it would have looked like in Margery's time, but it is now back on the market again, if anyone reading this is looking for a challenge and a readymade business?

We wanted to go now as the backbone of the garden, hardy geraniums, are now at their finest. It was a fine example of what a cottage garden should look like, and made us realise that actually our own efforts here at Barn Farm aren't that bad! They also had been subject to slug and snail attention this year, but the geraniums had sailed through undamaged as usual. Whilst out for the day, we also took the opportunity to visit two National Trust properties nearby. Tintinhull, and Lytes Cary. Both are mainly garden properties and well managed, but Lytes Cary does have an Arts and Crafts house attached as well. We didn't make it around the house, so that will be a trip for another day! The three properties made a full day. Just a pity that the drive home was not good due to major holdups on both bridges! Kibby's fish and chips (Bulwark) ended the day on

#### a high note!

Back home it is time to carry on trying to catch up with things in our own cottage garden, rejuvenated, after our day on the road. It was good to see others facing the same challenges as us, with slugs, endless weeding, including the odd pernicious weed such as bibby wine, couch grass and ground elder thrown in for good measure! One of the benefits of what has been a cold spring, is the fact that this year most of the flowers have grown slowly and are stronger as a result. Last year everything grew quickly and were very 'soft' as a result, meaning that they fell about all over the place. The under gardener had a lot of Chelsea 'chopping' to do last year (this is when you cut all the flower growth by about a third, around the time of the Chelsea Flower Show - hence the name. This obviously reduces the height of the plants which makes them more robust, and makes the flowering period later, but mor intense, as you get more blooms. The skill is trying to cut some, but not all of the plants, so that the actual flowering period is extended for much longer. The best to give your attention to are the taller growing perennials, such as members of the daisy family, phlox and similar. For many earlier flowering plants such as hardy geraniums, geums and Astrantia, another trick is to cut the growth down once the flowers have finished. The plants will then send out new growth, and have a second, although smaller crop of flowers, later in the year. It is well worth trying.

At the moment we are trying to catch up on the weeding and clearing. This was delayed because of the rain, and to some extent is now being slowed down by the lack of rain in recent weeks. One of the problems of our soil is that it is quite stoney and so makes weeding naturally difficult, but also it can set hard on the top as well when it starts to dry. This makes it impossible just to pull the weeds out, as you end up leaving the roots in the ground. You therefore have to loosen the soil with a fork first, but that then often results in the established plants wilting if the weather has really warmed up, which is not ideal. So, it is a case of getting a balance. We are always challenged by trees selfseeding as well as black berries and more than often, these will become established in the middle of our best flower plants! The only way to remove them, without digging everything out, is to cut them off as low as possible, and then brush on a weed killer. I still use Glyphosate for this job, as it is the only weedkiller that is up to the job. Unfortunately, if you need a large quantity, this is getting much harder to get hold of these days, unless you

happen to know a farmer! They can still buy in quantity as they have a 'holding number' details of which will be requested by the seller. Amateur gardeners can only buy a one litre bottle, and pay something like three times the price for the privilege!

Things in the vegetable beds have improved a bit in recent weeks as the growth has started to harden, and slightly drier weather has slowed down the slug attention, although it is still happening. In the big tunnel, we have been harvesting some lovely calabrese, cauliflowers, and early potatoes for some time, and more recently have started picking cucumbers, tomatoes and French beans. The shallots and garlic are also starting to die back, so these will be lifted shortly and allowed to dry off, before storing. Once dry, the beds will be cleared, and will be replanted. We usually try a further crop of calabrese, to mature late summer / autumn, as well as some of the over wintering greens, which will give us an early crop around April to early May next year.

We have some major problems in the large fruit cage, which has various varieties of currants, as well as raspberries. It drastically needs weeding before the weeds themselves set seed and spread further, But far worse, is that the raspberries have virtually all succumbed to raspberry root rot. This as the name suggests results in the roots all rotting off, and the infection will stay in the ground for many years. There is nothing that you can do, apart from dig everything up and plant something completely different. I'm thinking that there is a big bonfire in the offing!

The cold weather has also been very unkind to the bees, and twice so far, the National Bee Unit (part of Defra) has warned beekeepers to keep an eye out, as hives have been dying out due to starvation. I had been tempted earlier on to take some still runny honey off a couple of the hives, as they had way more stores than necessary, but other things got in the way and so I never did. Just as well really as it turns out. I have had a couple of swarms, which have replaced two further lost colonies over winter. Both of these were weak, and I should have really taken steps to combine the bees with stronger hives before winter set in. I have always struggled to do this successfully, so gave them the benefit of doubt, which unfortunately didn't work. Perhaps more of them next month.

#### Shirenewton Clock Chimes no more!

Many of you will have noticed that our beloved church clock has not functioned for some considerable time.

The clock, which is located within the church tower was paid for by public subscription and erected in memory of the men of our parish who died whilst serving in the First World War. Since that time the clock has been lovingly cared for by the community, with servicing and repair works covered by Shirenewton Community Council.

The clock itself is well known in the horologist community, sharing elements of its' design with those employed in the design of Big Ben within the Elizabeth Tower. The clock is of high quality with an identical clock on display at the Royal Observatory in Greenwich.

Despite regular servicing, a recent inspection revealed a number of serious issues and the removal of the clock mechanism for complete renovation has been recommended. The quotation for the works is considerable coming in at a figure close to  $\pounds 30,000$ . Whilst the Community Council could look to extend some funding from community reserves to cover around half of this cost, we, as a community, would need to look at ways to fund the remaining 50%.

Before we start to consider ways in which such works could be funded, we first need to be sure there is the desire within the Community to see these works undertaken and our clock restored to full working order. If the answer to this is yes, then we would also welcome ideas and thoughts on potential fund-raising activities that we could adopt to get us across the line.

#### **STARGAZING**



Later in the evening the Summer Triangle is overhead. This is a prominent triangle formed by the bright stars Altair, to the South of the triangle, Vega, closest to the Western horizon, and Deneb, to the East. Deneb forms the tail of the cross-shaped constellation Cygnus, the Swan. From our perspective the three stars have similar brightness. However, they lie at different distances from Earth. Deneb is an extremely luminous star at 1400 light years from Earth whilst Vega and Altair are less luminous and are both much closer to Earth at a distance of about 20 light years.

The familiar seven stars of Ursa Major, the Great Bear or Plough, are to be seen in the north-west, with the "W" of Cassiopeia climbing into the north-eastern sky.

The slightly yellow planet Saturn is low in the East in July, moving to the South-East and higher in the sky as we move into August. The almost Full Moon is near Saturn on 24<sup>th</sup> July. On 20<sup>th</sup> August the Full Moon joins Saturn.

Fifty five years ago, on July 20, 1969, the Apollo 11 Lunar Lander descended to the surface of the Moon and Neil Armstrong became the first man to set foot on its surface.

James Bradley was vicar of the parish of Bridstow, near Ross-on-Wye in Monmouthshire until 1721, when he changed vocation and became a full-time astronomer. Isaac Newton considered him to be the "best astronomer in Europe" and he was eventually made Astronomer Royal. Bradley carried out measurements that proved the Earth orbits the Sun, and that led to the first estimates of the distances of stars.

In all the excitement, I forgot to mention in the May entry that the parish magazine has now been available on the church website for over 20 years! The first parish magazine we have on the website is from May 2004. Somethings never change. Hot topics from the Community Council minutes include dog fouling in and around Shirenewton, The Church clock, and traffic calming.

The magazine does provide a fascinating social history of the village. Jumping forward 10 years to May 2014, again it's the 'same 'ole'. Me bashing on about important it is to have different passwords for different websites and, interesting, a description of a hotmail "cross-site request forgery" attack – well worth reading if you are that way minded!

There was an interesting article in the Sunday Times back in April, which described how easy it is to use artificial intelligence to clone voices which are then used to instruct payments to fraudsters. In this particular case, it was an agreed experiment with the CEO of a company. The security researcher, used his social media posts to clone his voice, managed to convince the CEO's mobile phone company to send out a replacement SIM card, and then used that and the closed voice to send a WhatsApp voice note to the company's Finance Director instructing him to transfer a sum of money to an account he controlled.

This raises two interesting things: (i) the ability to clone the voice of someone, and perhaps most importantly, (ii) the ability to get someone's sim card. This latter aspect is known as 'Sim-swapping' fraud and this type of fraud in on the rise. If you think about it, everything these days depends on your phone. And, more specifically, you being in control of your own phone. If a fraudster can convince your mobile provide that they are you and you've lost your phone/sim and to send out another sim card to their address, they have you digital life in their hands.

Therefore, it is really important to keep a sharp eye on your phone and check any unusual activity. Don't ignore any message from your provider (but make sure that they really are from your provider) and, if you suddenly lose signal and a re-boot doesn't get it back, be worried and contact your service provider immediately. To prevent such attacks (in so far as you can), have strong passwords and security questions with your service provider. Do not use information which fraudsters can get from your social media such as pet names, car types, etc.

Remember, and I regularly repeat this, when setting security questions you DO NOT have to answer literally the question asked.

So, for example, if a security question is "In what city were you born?" or "What is your mother's maiden name?" (i.e. answers which could easily found via social media), lie. The software simply has a question and stores the answer. If you answer 'The Moon' to the question "In what city were you born?", the software isn't going to reject that answer. It will simply store your answer and compare it against your answer to that question when you are asked. So, make something up, but make a note of your made up answer – in a secure way.

Again, at the risk of becoming repetitive, please don't stored passwords and security questions on an excel spreadsheet or text note on your PC. If you don't want to have a secure facility like a password manager, write down the password and any answers to security questions in a note book which you hide.

And briefly going back to the voice cloning, just be aware that when someone (perhaps a Grandchild or similar) sends you a voice note saying that they are in trouble and need money urgently, it may not be them. It may be a cloned voice. In the Times article we were discussing above, even the CEO whose voice was cloned thought it was his own voice when he listened to the voice note.

Finally, as a reminder, when you disappear on holiday don't be tempted to connect to the free wifi and doing anything serious like financial transactions. As Forbes says: One of the biggest risks associated with using public Wi-Fi is that it can be unsecured and vulnerable to attack. Hackers can use this vulnerability to steal your personal information or install malicious software on your devices without you knowing.

On that happy note, safe browsing and enjoy the summer holidays.


