Extracts from the minutes of the monthly meeting held in February 2024.

Church Clock Maintenance

COUNTY COUNCILLOR REPORT February 2024

County Councillor L Brown advised:

<u>County Council on the 18th of January 2024</u>
The County Council meeting covered reports on age friendly communities, review of the decision to charge a second home council tax premium, annual council tax reduction scheme, asset management strategy and investment committee review.

There was a motion to council regretting the lack of engagement with local community and business groups in the development of the Local Transport Plan 2024-29. There were also various questions to council. The details of the meeting can be found at the following link:

Budget 2023/24

The Welsh Government provisional settlement had an average 3.1% increase in Revenue Support grant for Local Authorities in Wales but Monmouthshire County Council only received a provisional settlement of 2.3%.

The following main proposals are being considered by the Labour administration:

7.5% increase in council tax. £835,000 cut to schools. £2 breakfast club charge
Car Parking charges up 10%
Garden bin waste fee up 10%
End to free food waste bags
Leisure centre opening hours cut
Outdoor adventure £70K cut.
Gwent Music Service £39K cut.
Concessionary school transport cost increase by 10%

SHIRENEWTON 800 LECTERN FALL

Long, long ago in a society far, far away, when "pandemic" was a word we hardly knew, let alone used, we started discussing the forthcoming 800th anniversary of the founding of our church, which fell in 2020. We also, quite separately, discussed the fall for the lectern which was becoming rather worn.

As well as planning some exciting events, inspired by local resident Angela, of J&B Sewing, I considered designing a quilt. During a visit to Buckfast Abbey in 2019 I noticed the beautiful design of the floor borders and started to think about a design based around that. Having spoken to Angela, I realised that a quilt was not going to be very practical to display and there the idea might have died, had 2020 been just another year.

Locked down at home, and with most of our plans cancelled, I rediscovered a love of counted cross stitch that had been neglected for many years, and having finished a kit started to look for a project into which I could have more artistic input. Co-incidentally my university roommate is also a keen cross stitcher, and encouraged me to look at some designs, and somehow a vague idea began to form into a plan.

I started work in September2020 on a design for a lectern fall, working on dark navy linen, in the four liturgical colours, so that the finished article is suitable for use all year round:

White and gold, used in Christmas and Easter
Purple used in Advent and Lent
Green used in 'Ordinary' time – the routine Sundays in between
the special seasons
Red used at Palm Sunday and Pentecost

The design uses excerpts from two patterns from Long Dog Samplers (www.logdogsampler.com) by the talented Jools Line, that seemed to have an appropriate celtic influence for a church in Wales, and a border based on that floor in Buckfast Abbey. Of course, life gradually returned to 'normal' and I had less time to work on my design, but slowly, over the years the plan became reality and finally in February 2024, has been installed in position. Why not pop into Church one day to see it? That's the only way to really appreciate the intricacies of the design!

Background



Gardening Corner

Another month gone. There is little point in complaining about the weather as I think everyone will know just how wet it has been, and complaining sadly won't make it any better. Suffice to say that a lot of climate change 'doubters' are now actually starting to realise just how much climate change is going to impact our planet and also how we may lead our lives. There will no doubt be many who will continue to deny it is happening – a certain politician in America for example, but hopefully he has enough self-created problems of his own to be dealing with at present! But everyone is entitled to their own views. From the perspective of working outside and getting the essential maintenance jobs in the garden done, time has been extremely limited. Fortunately, here at Barn Farm, no matter what the weather, there is always something we can do. The only thing that has ever really stopped us gardening is heavy snow and thus far this year, we haven't had much of that. Long may this continue, but I always remind myself that we have a greater risk of snow at Easter these days, than we do having it at Christmas.

I have said previously, that as our soil is stoney underneath, it can be free draining and parts of the garden are quite free draining. Despite the copious rainfall, there have been a few days in the last month where it has been dry enough to get on some of the flower beds and do some essential maintenance jobs. With the Assistant Head Gardener motoring on in front of me, clearing away a lot of the old plant growth, I followed on behind pruning all of the roses as I came across them, then weeding the ground over as I retreated back off each bed.

Removing old growth is a moot subject, as many gardening writers say that this shouldn't be done at this time of year, as this growth harbours and protects insects and provides food for other fauna. Acknowledging this to be the case we try to undertake a 'halfwayhouse' approach, in that the most tender plants we try to leave alone altogether, whilst everything else we remove about half of the growth rather than all of it. We do remove all of the old growth from the softer, more leafy plants, such as hostas, and daylilies (Hemerocallis), simply because this wet mush harbours way too many slugs and snails, and protects them from any frosty weather that we might have. We do have wildlife pond here, so we do get a good population of frogs and toads (as I write this, we already

have loads of 'spawn' already in the larger of the two ponds. But no matter how many frogs and toads we have, it is never enough to keep the numbers of slugs and snails under control. One outcome of the wetter and milder winter weather, that we simply can't do anything about. So the few days we have managed 'on the soil' has meant that we have been able to prune all of our roses back. This task can still be done in March or even April if needs be, but the later you leave it, the more the roses will be impacted, simply because you will remove more 'active' growth and it will take much longer for the roses to recover and put-up new growth. This will impact the numbers of flowers in the months ahead.

The incessant rain had made our main concrete slab path down the garden very slippery, so the 'Assistant' had asked if I could power wash it to remove the algal growth. One of the very rare sunny days was promised, so I got everything ready and blasted the path. I have to admit that it made things much better - and safer of course. I was enjoying myself so much, that, as the large greenhouse was virtually empty of 'stuff', I decided to give that a blast as well. The glass has become quite green, both inside and out, which was starting to impact the light levels inside. Half an hour later, I was quite impressed with my efforts and you could certainly tell the difference. It made me realise that the two tunnels were also quite bad, again inside and out, so I need to turn my attention to them next. Unfortunately the plastic covers, especially on the smaller tunnel, have been on for several years, so I probably won't be using the pressure washer, just in case the power is too much and it blasts right through the cover. Instead, I have a soft brush, on a pole, that connects to the hosepipe. A much softer means of approach! But a drier day to tackle this job would be nice.

Inside the tunnels and greenhouses, I have been carrying out some essential maintenance whilst the wet weather continues. In the smaller of the two, each end door needed the fine netting replacing as this was starting to rot. This netting allows for a good flow of air though the tunnel, but the mesh is fine enough to prevent any nasty pests, such as cabbage white butterflies, or carrot flies to gain entry. This job was soon completed. From there, I moved into the large tunnel, where the timbers supporting the large top growing bed had all rotted, allowing the

bed to collapse over the path between the top and middle beds. This was a major job, but one that needed doing. New timbers had to be bought, then this had to be treated to try and prevent rotting. Next job was to then dig out all the soil that had collapsed, throwing it back onto the bed. This took several hours to complete. but it looked good when it had been done. This then allowed me to start replacing the support posts that had rotted away, before erecting the treated timbers as a low 'wall' of some ten inches high, creating the raised bed. In all, the job took a day to complete, but we now have a bed that is some 6 feet wide and nearly 24 feet long. I'm hoping that I can find enough manure to then cover it over, ready for planting up again in the coming months. Because this bed runs across the slope and is also alongside the tunnel cover, there is a height restriction on what we can grow. Therefore, most crops tend to be no more than two or three feet tall. Melons and courgettes are ideal as we grow these across the ground, rather than up supports, as are onions, shallots and garlic. The Latter also benefit from not being exposed too much to wet weather. I planted the shallot and garlic 'sets' from bulbs/cloves that we had grown last year and which I had selected and stored ready for the purpose. I grow them in individual pots, that are potted up in January and kept in one of the greenhouses whilst they start to grow. They are currently growing on well, and I'll be looking to get them moved to this new tunnel bed in the coming weeks.

I have turned on the small warming tray in the small greenhouse, and the first seeds have now been sown. Some will soon need repotting. Once this is done the main warming bed will also be turned on, and seed sowing will begin in earnest.

The few sunnier, warm days we have had have meant that the bees have started to fly and they are making the most of the early sources of pollen such as the daffodils, hellebores and snowdrops in the garden and the hazel catkins in the field hedgerows. The continuing wet weather will not be doing the bees any favours, so let's hope things improve in the coming weeks. It is still far too cold to start opening the hives up yet I have started doing a little maintenance on our small pond in which we have a number of fancy goldfish. I say a number, but actually conditions clearly suit them, as they have bred profusely over the years.

We have actually decided that drastic action is needed as the pond is not big enough for the numbers that we have. So, if anyone is looking for some fancy goldfish for free then please give us a call on 650604.

Spinach pesto

Ingredients

- 1 large packet of spinach, washed.
- 2 cloves of garlic
- 150g Parmigiano or Parmesan cheese
- 1 small red pepper
- 200g mixed unsalted nuts.

This is a good recipe for a time like this when many of us are trying to shop just once a week. You can cook the spinach when you buy it and pop it into the freezer for use later. I like to make pancakes in advance as well, they freeze beautifully layered with greaseproof and stored in a freezer bag. Ingredients for two people: Six savoury pancakes (your usual recipe) 500g fresh spinach 100g Gorgonzola 100g ricotta 50gm or more Parmesan 50gm or more cheddar or any other cheese to hand A few spring onions finely chopped. Grated nutmeg

Cook the spinach and drain thoroughly.

Mix with the crumbled cheeses (except the Parmesan).

Make a very thick bechamel sauce and put approx. two tablespoons into the spinach mixture.

Add extra milk to the sauce to give a pouring consistency and set aside.

Bechamel sauce

Season the spinach mixture to taste and add the onions and some grated nutmeg.

Divide the mixture between the six pancakes, roll up and put in a buttered ovenproof dish.

Pour over the remaining bechamel sauce and scatter with Parmesan. Put into a hot oven to heat through and brown on top, approximately 15 to 20 minutes. Serve with a crisp salad for a difference in textures. If there is no salad to hand, vegetables are fine, but preferably something like carrots or baby sweet corn to give a contrast in colour. Enjoy!

February is the month that sees the training day for the Monmouth Branch of The Llandaff and Monmouth Diocesan Association of Church Bell Ringers [L&MDACBR].

Shirenewton Tower supports this training day each year. The event was based at St Woolos cathedral, starting with refreshments and introductions. Three Shirenewton Ringers attended as students, four as helpers and one as a Course Tutor. Five courses were provided ranging from one where the students are learning to ring a bell by itself and move on to ringing with others, through to one where students are taking their first steps into learning their first bell ringing "method".

A method is a piece of ringing where bells change positions one place at a time to ring unrepeated permutations. It takes most ringers several years to reach this stage in their learning. The method being taught on the Monmouth Branch training day was Plain Bob Doubles. This is commonly the

first method learned. Each group, consisting Each group, consisting of students, helpers and tutor travels out to a local tower for a practical ringing session before returning to St Woolos for a "pizza" lunch. Lunch is followed by a second practical ringing session at a different church.



Two of our ringers have recently received certificates through this scheme. STARGAZING



In the evening sky the bright planet Jupiter can be seen in the West following the setting sun. It is joined by the fine crescent Moon on the 13th March.

The Moon is at First Quarter on the 16th March and sits approximately half-way between the bright star Betelgeuse in Orion and Capella in the constellation Auriga. At First Quarter half of the surface of the Moon is illuminated by the Sun. The Moon is Full on 24th March, 8 days later.

The name Aldebaran derives from the Arabic meaning "the follower", because it seems to follow the Pleiades, the cluster of stars to its right.

Much the brightest star in the sky, Sirius can be seen to the South, below and to the left of the constellation Orion. The name "Sirius" is derived from the Greek word meaning scorching. For the ancient Egyptians the appearance of Sirius coincided with the annual flooding of the Nile Valley, vital to growing crops. This event was of such importance to them that it marked the beginning of their year.

The pair of stars high above Sirius and Orion is part of the constellation Gemini, the Twins, and they are called Castor and Pollux. In mythology Castor and Pollux were the twin sons of the Queen of Sparta. Castor was mortal, but Pollux was not – his father was none other than Jupiter, who had paid a clandestine visit to the Queen. When Castor was killed in battle, Pollux pleaded to be allowed to share his immortality with his brother; this was granted, and both boys were placed in the heavens. Gemini is crossed by the Milky Way – the dense belt of stars that make up our own galaxy.

The Vernal Equinox occurs on 20th March, when day and night are equal, with exactly 12 hours between sunrise and sunset. This is a useful day for getting your bearings right as the sun rises due east and sets due west wherever you may be.

FAIRTRADE NEWS FEBRUARY 2024

The Problem with Seeds

Transform Trade is the name of the charity arm of the now defunct company 'Traidcraft' and it continues its excellent work of supporting marginalized farmers and FAIRTRADE producers from the global south. It documents the



struggles of these workers, suffering from the ravages of the worsening climate crisis and the devastating demands of international corporations, who appear to chase profit at any cost. It goes without saying that seeds are the life blood of our food system – but farmers' rights to exchange, sell and use the seeds they want are not quaranteed.

Smallholder farmers in the Global South know their seeds – they are their livelihood. They know the best varieties that work in their soil and when to bank and save seed for a later date. This is the kind of farming that builds climate resilience and biodiversity. The right for these farmers to choose their own seed is under threat. New laws, heavily lobbied for by big business are being introduced across many countries to limit what smallholders can do with their seeds – in alignment with seed patent laws.

These laws have taken effect in Kenya – meaning that local farmers can no longer share, exchange or sell their own seeds. As a result, many farmers are left with no choice but to buy often costly certified commodity seeds from certified companies. Just 4 corporate giants (Bayer, Corteva, BASF and ChemChina/Syngenta) own 60% of the global seed market. These seeds are often designed to be used with harmful and expensive fertilisers and pesticides.

Transform Trade works with village groups in Jharkhand, India to create community seed banks, which operate like a library - seeds can be borrowed and returned and diverse varieties preserved for future generations.

Community based seed sharing instead of corporate control is often better for the environment, safeguards local knowledge and prevents local farmers from paying overinflated prices to sow their crops. The shockingly high suicide rate of Indian cotton farmers is a direct result of their purchases of special seeds, requiring costly specific fertilisers and insecticides. It is a vicious circle which can drive small scale farmers to be compelled to repeatedly borrow money until they see no way out.

But the UK Government is pressurising countries in the Global South to introduce more restrictive seed laws by putting these

requirements in its free trade deals. Currently the UK has 21 trade agreements that promote these laws. It is vital that farmers' rights are protected and that restrictive seed laws are left out of these deals.

As consumers we have the power to effect change. Do seek out The Fairtrade Foundation and Transform Trade websites, or make purchases from Ethical Superstore. Look out for B corporations – which are committed (and certified!) to ethical trading eg FatFace Rude Health (imo the best almond milk – organic Italian almonds!).

And, before we know it, it's the March Parish Mag deadline and I've made zero progress on my 'windows 11 options project' as outlined last month.

I was, however, asked the other day by a reader whose memory is far better than mine, what happened to the back-up disk I was trying to rescue. This was outlined in the Feb '23 magazine and, to cut a long story short, my local NAS back-up drive had failed. After much endeavour I concluded that the drive was fine but the electronics were not responding to network access requests. It seems that this could have been the result of a power trip or surge which fried the motherboard, etc. After much time watching YouTube videos and reading blogs, disassembly was the only option. So after half an hour or so of 'fun' I ended up with a dissembled unit complete with hard disk and motherboard, etc. The various suggestions on how to access the data on the drive (which is based on a version of Linux) didn't work for me. So, the final throw of the dice was to purchase an old working My Book Live from eBay, take it to bits, remove the drive it came with and stick mine in there. Then, theoretically, I'd be able to access the data. Did it work? In a word, no!

I make no apologies for re-emphasising the importance of back-up and, not only backing up, but checking the drives are working and you are able to restore from those drives. I back-up on a cycle which includes local NAS drives, Google Drive, OneDrive and another cloud storage system. The idea is that, should any one of these fail, I have the others to fall back on. Make sure you back-up your critical data, photos, etc.

Moving onto the subject of scams, my wife and I have been watching the Scam Interceptors TV show which, as the publicity says, 'hunts down the scammers plaguing our lives'. It's an interesting watch and available on iPlayer.

On the subject of phishing scams, the scammers are getting ever more sophisticated. According to the cybercrime Tarian website (which apparently consists of a team of multi-disciplinary police officers and staff seconded from three of the Welsh forces; South Wales, Gwent, and Dyfed-Powys), because computers are now able to support Cyrillic alphabets, Cyrillic letters can be subtly inserted alongside Latin letters. So legitimate URLs to reputable sites, such as those belongings to banks, etc. can be duplicated with one or two letters changed to Cyrillic. The example they give on their website (http://tinyurl.com/9azrfntx) is below:

Spot the Difference?

maybank2u.com is not the same as maybαnk2u.com

citibank.com is not the same as citibank.com

(the first one is correct, the second one is from hackers)

The "a" in the later url is a cyrillic alphabet.

An average internet user can easily fall for this. Be careful for every mail requiring you to click on a link.

Please Stay Alert

They also highlight the fact that "QR codes are increasingly being used within phishing emails instead of the more traditional URL links. Email recipients will be asked to scan the QR code with their phone — perhaps under the pretence of asking them to 'authenticate themselves', and will then be directed to a malicious site."

So, beware, they are out to get you!

Finally, if you are an EV driver, you'll have noticed a severe drop in range on the colder days. Feeling sympathy then for those Tesla owners in Chicago (as reported in The Register here http://tinyurl.com/2nj2y4up) where local media reported public charging stations turning into "car graveyards" because motorists were unable to power their vehicles. Dozens of cars were reportedly abandoned at the Tesla supercharging stations as they refused to accept a charge. This is, apparently, because they had neglected to pre-condition the battery and get it up to the optimal temperature to accept a fast charge. The catch is that preconditioning also drains the battery. Apparently Tesla itself recommends activating climate settings at least 30-45 minutes before departure. I guess we should be thankful we don't get winters like Chicago.

On that happy note, safe browsing.


