# The Coventry Cross of Nails By Revd Zoe Pimentel

As we edge into November, we enter the season of Remembrance—a time to ensure that the fallen soldiers from wars past and present are never forgotten.

If you've attended a Sunday service that I've led, you may

have noticed the rather large metal cross I wear around my neck. It's something I wear at every church service, and it holds deep personal significance for me. This is no ordinary cross—it is the Coventry Cross of Nails, and its history and symbolism are profound, and it is at this time of year in particular that its meaning hits home to me.

For those of you unfamiliar with the story behind this extraordinary cross, it is my pleasure to share it with you.

### A Symbol Born From Destruction

The Coventry Cross of Nails has its history in World War II. During the war, the city of Coventry endured heavy bombing, and on one fateful night, the 14th-century cathedral was destroyed. In the aftermath, as the dust and smoke began to settle, a priest discovered three large nails among the ruins—fallen from the cathedral's burned roof. These nails were bound together to form the shape of a cross.

In the face of such destruction, the Dean of the cathedral, Provost Richard Howard, took a remarkable step. Behind the altar, on the smoke -blackened wall of the sanctuary, he had inscribed the words: "Father Forgive." Not "Father forgive them," but simply "Father forgive."

Provost Howard recognized the potential for evil within every human heart, regardless of nationality. He believed that rather than placing blame on others, we should first look inward, seeking God's forgiveness for ourselves, as well as seeking it for others. His hope was that if more people adopted this approach, much of the harm in the world could be prevented.

#### A Global Symbol of Reconciliation

From this humble act, the Coventry Cross of Nails emerged as a profound symbol of reconciliation and peace, one that has inspired people worldwide. After the war, crosses of nails were presented to the cathedrals of Kiel, Dresden, and Berlin—cities similarly devastated by Allied bombing, as an act of peace and reconciliation. Today, there are nearly 300 churches and communities across the world that have been entrusted with a Coventry Cross of Nails, recognizing their commitment to this important work for peace.



The clergy of Coventry Cathedral, even in the darkest days of the war, refused to allow the destruction to breed division or hatred. Instead, they remained steadfastly devoted to the gospel message of reconciliation, as demonstrated by Jesus Christ on the cross.

#### A Personal Gift

The Coventry Cross of Nails is not something you can purchase. Each cross is gifted by the cathedral to individuals or communities chosen for their dedication to reconciliation. This is why the cross I wear is so precious to me.

In August 2018, I had the honour of being employed part-time by Coventry Cathedral as their Lead Chaplain Missioner. My main task was to bring more people through the cathedral's doors, helping them to appreciate and learn from the sacred space, while also working to bring more children and families to visit and explore. It was during this time that I was gifted the cross, a symbol of the cathedral's mission and my own commitment, as a cathedral representative, to the message of peace.

As we reflect during this season of Remembrance, may we each be inspired by the story of the Coventry Cross of Nails. Let us seek reconciliation in our own lives, and look to the example of Christ, who calls us to heal the wounds of division, bringing hope and peace to a world that sorely needs it.

Extracts from the minutes of the monthly meeting held on 7<sup>th</sup> October 2024.

### Planning applications considered

# DM/2024/01098 - First Floor Extension - Grove View, Bully Hole Road, Earlswood

Grove View is a small 1 ½ storey bungalow of (relatively) modern design comprising lounge, dining room, kitchen, and 2 bedrooms (one downstairs and one in the loft) located just off the Bulley Hole Bottom road below the Usk B road.

The application is for a substantial enlargement of the loft to provide 3 bedrooms, bathroom and en suite which requires front and rear dormers to the right-hand side of the bungalow and reconstructing the left hand end as a gable front and back, the roof line of which appears to be slightly higher than the current roof ridge. The footprint appears to be unchanged (no depth or length measurements are given) but the total floor area is stated as currently 85 sqm increasing by 77sqm to 162 sqm.

Councillors may wish to recall that the criteria of MCC Planning Policy H6 is that an extension to any rural dwelling has to be modest, respect or enhance the appearance of the existing building and be subordinate to the existing building, 'modest' being normally interpreted as an increase in the overall volume of 30% over the size of the existing dwelling. A larger volume will not normally be allowed unless it can be clearly shown either that there will be no harmful intrusive impact in the landscape through the increased size of the dwelling or that there is an enhancement in the appearance of the existing dwelling, subject, in any event, to the increase in volume being no more than 50%.

MCC's Landscape Officer considers the proposed extension is relatively modest and will enhance the appearance the existing dwelling as the existing dwelling is not of a traditional nature in terms of

being a rural cottage.

The building will have rendered walls and slate roof (no colours specified) with grey UPVC windows, doors, fascia and rainwater goods. The application specifies new tree planting, hedgerow planting to the northern boundary, reinstatement of parking and lawns and new patio areas.

The council unanimously voted for no objection but SCC requests conditions as to muting of the colour finishes to

blend in with the landscape.

DM/2024/00921 - Little Bushes Farm, Earlswood, Shirenewton, Updated Plan in response to SCC comments on conversion of existing storage outbuilding to create gym / home office ancillary to existing dwelling

Councillors will recall the recent application for conversion of a storage barn to residential use as a gym and office. SCC objected for want of detail on measurements, materials and colour finishes.

An updated plan has been submitted, essentially the same as before but with limited additional information. The natural stone walls are to remain, with vertical timber cladding on the front but still no colour has been specified. The roof is to consist of corrugated roof sheets in brown, but the two Velux windows are still missing. Windows and doors are uPVC/ aluminium with anthracite frames, and rainwater goods in black uPVC. Building width and length measurements have been added as  $7.385 \times 10.88 \text{ sqm}$  (just over our estimate).

**SCC unanimously voted to object to this application** as the updated drawing does not specify the location of the Velux windows nor the colour finish of the timber cladding but considers that these could be covered by a condition that the colour finish of the cladding be muted. As previously, SCC would also request conditions as to restrict the barn to use with the bungalow as a single-family unit and to remove the general consent for extensions improvements and additional outbuildings without further planning consent.

# DM/2024/01146 Modification of condition no. 10 (replace parking arrangement drawing) of consent DM/2022/00263 Rhewl Cottage, Rhewl Farm, Shirenewton

The property lies on the road from Shirenewton passed Rhewl Farm and consists of a detached house and separate garage block. The 2022 consent related to an application for the extension and change of use of existing garage into dog day care facility, along with the change of use of field to dog walking paddock.

Consent was granted subject to conditions including:

**8** The dog day care element of the proposal hereby approved is limited to a maximum of 6 dogs at a time. Reason: In the interests of Highway Safety and Residential Amenity

**9** The use hereby approved shall not operate outside of 8am - 6pm

daily. Reason: In the interests of residential amenity.

**10** Prior to beneficial use of the use hereby approved, the parking and turning provision as shown on approved plan 1535-7 must be provided and maintained in perpetuity

That plan showed 8 parking spaces, allowing 2 for the house and 6 for the business.

MCC's Highway Authority had commented on the original application that it is satisfied that the application site is limited to a maximum of 6 dogs per day therefore the proposed car parking and turning layout proposed is sufficient for both domestic and business elements of the site and therefore is unlikely to impact on the adjacent public highway.

The applicant seeks to amend the approved design to create a more balanced and sympathetic layout for the parking and driveway arrangement, considering both the residential and business use of the property.

The applicant's Design Statement asserts as follows: The current approved design, which includes 8 parking spaces in a utilitarian configuration, has a commercial feel that detracts from the rural character of the property and its surroundings. The residential dwelling itself only requires 3 parking spaces. The dog care facility, which accommodates a maximum of 6 dogs at any one time, operates under a carefully managed drop-off schedule, ensuring that clients arrive at staggered times to prevent multiple dogs arriving simultaneously. This drop off process typically takes only a few minutes per client, meaning that any vehicles are parked for short periods. If two clients arrive at the same time, the business is flexible enough to accommodate them parking in tandem, 2 which is not an issue due to the familiarity between the family-run business and its regular clients. The proposed design now includes 3 parking spaces for the residential dwelling and 2 designated spaces for clients, with a 6m x 6m turning area that can be used as emergency parking in rare cases. This layout maintains the rural character of the property while still effectively servicing the dog care business.

### The council unanimously voted for no objection

**Play park Area:** A report that rear gate is in poor state. This is a safety issue as the Gate is used by trades. Clerk to measure and seek various quotes for plastic, wood and metal.

**Wreaths and memorial path** – Clerk to order wreaths and book memorial path clean and clear ready for Remembrance Sunday

# Home to school transport- Special People Committee on the 19<sup>th</sup> of September and Cabinet on the 25<sup>th</sup> of September 2024

This was called in due to concerns about the consultation being over the Summer and discussed at the Special People Committee meeting on the 19<sup>th</sup> of September and referred to Cabinet. However, Cabinet on the 25<sup>th</sup> of September reconfirmed the main changes so that Primary school transport which would change to the statutory limits from 1.5 miles to 2 miles and Secondary from 2 miles to 3 miles distance from the school. This will impact the school years 25/26. However, the Council still need to assess the available walking route.

# <u>Place Committee on the 10<sup>th</sup> of October 2024-RLDP Deposit Stage</u>

The agenda for this meeting covers the RLDP deposit stage of the plan. It covers both the strategic sites and other sites in rural areas including villages. The strategic sites include the change in relation to the previous proposals of 145 houses at Bayfield Chepstow and instead places this housing at the Mounton Road site next to the High Beech roundabout. This Mounton Road site is also expected to include a hotel and residential care home. There are also proposed significant house building at Caldicot East/ North

Portskewett, all of which will further exacerbate the traffic congestion issues.

There is a site being proposed for 26 houses in Shirenewton for Land West of Red Landes which is on the Earlswood Road past the village boundary on the opposite side of the road to the recreation hall.

The 6-week public consultation on the deposit stage of the RLDP proposals is expected to follow the County Council meeting on the 24<sup>th</sup> of October to cover the period from the 4<sup>th</sup> of November to the 16<sup>th</sup> of December.



#### **NEWS FROM THE MINISTRY AREA**

Our new Hub church will soon be up and running! This exciting initiative, funded by the Representative Body for 5 years, will see a new worshipping community based in St Christopher's, with a full time Leader and a Children and Families worker. While people of all ages will be welcome, the focus will be to encourage younger people (basically, anyone under the age of 40) to join our church community, as this is the demographic which is sadly underrepresented in all our churches at the moment.

Zoe and Barney Pimentel will be sharing the role of Hub Leader, alongside their existing Ministry Area Leader responsibilities. Claire Edwards is the other member of the team. A wonderful commissioning service was held in Tredegar on Thursday 26th September, led by Bishop Cherry. Archdeacon Stella Bailey preached an inspiring sermon about Faith and Hope. We Hope for growth in our church, but in order to achieve that, we must have Faith and perseverance to work to achieve our vision, sometimes against opposition or apathy.

Cynthia Matthews has been appointed as the Ministry Area Safeguarding Officer. She and Zoe are developing a register of those who require or have received DBS checks and training. Module A training can be done online, and Module B training is normally face to face. If you are on the MAC, or hold a position in your church which brings you into contact with children or vulnerable adults. please contact Cynthia to check what training you require. It's not onerous (about 40 minutes for Module A and 2 hours for Module B). A very interesting and useful Module B course was held in Shirenewton recently and further sessions are being arranged. Safeguarding is not just about protecting the vulnerable while they are in church – it is also about recognising those in our church community who may be suffering physical, psychological, financial or other abuse or neglect wherever it is occurring. Our Provincial Safeguarding Officer is Colin Taylor and anyone who suspects abuse should contact him in the first instance for advice, via the Diocesan website.

Barney and Zoe are keen to involve and train lay people to assist with leading worship, leading prayers, and carrying out pastoral ministry. The Church in Wales now formally recognises and commissions people to these important roles. Barney and Zoe are running a course for Worship leaders, and pastoral ministry training is also available. Please contact them if you are interested and want to find out more.





# Nerys's Natty Nosh

**Seafood.** We all know the benefits of eating Salmon, but if you're after something different which contains the health benefits of omega 3 why not choose: -Manila clams, Yellowtail, Sea Bass, Bluefin Tuna, Anchovies, Caviar, Cockles. Oysters, Fish roe, Grey Mullet, Hake, Halibut, John Dory, Mackerel, Trout, Red Mullet, Salmon, sardines, Spiny lobster and Swordfish.

I had a delivery of beautiful courgettes and red peppers from @Riverford so decided to make this dish.

Courgette spaghetti with seared tuna

steak and spicy red pepper sauce. I made the sauce by frying garlic, ginger, spring onion, in chili oil. Then added soya sauce and a teaspoon of sherry. The tuna steak I seared very quickly on both sides with a little chili oil.



Asian salmon Serves 2 DELICIOUS.

Ingredients
2 salmon fillets
1 tbsp oil

25cm fresh ginger 1 tsp lemongrass paste.

2 garlic cloves 1 tsp lime juice

1 red chilli

250ml coconut milk 4 spring onions

1 tbsp soya sauce

Coriander Serve with rice noodles.

Method

Sauté the chopped spring onions and diced red chilli in a frying pan until soft.

Place the rice noodles in a bowl, add a little salt and cover with boiling water. Leave for 5 minutes

In a mini food processor or magic bullet blitz the garlic, ginger, lime juice, lemongrass and coconut milk. Then add to the frying pan. Allow to come to the boil. Taste and add the soya sauce. Add the salmon, flesh down in the sauce.

Turn the heat down, cover with a lid and simmer gently for 4 minutes.

Take the salmon out. Allow the sauce to continue cooking for a minute or so. Taste and add more soya sauce if needed. Drain the noodles and place on the warmed plate.

Add the salmon then the hot sauce.

Garnish with coriander and chopped raw chillies.



Teriyaki salmon and prawns with stir fry vegetables, pea shoots, ginger, soya sauce and garlic dressing, viola and dill leaves.

For the Teriyaki salmon and prawns, you will need: - Ingredients:

- 500g salmon fillets
- 1/2 cup soy sauce
- 1/4 cup sherry or mirin
- 2 tablespoons sake (optional)
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 teaspoon ginger, grated
- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil Method
- 1. In a bowl, mix soy sauce, mirin, sake (or sherry) honey, minced garlic, and grated ginger to make the teriyaki sauce.
- 2. Place salmon fillets and prawns in a shallow dish and pour half of the teriyaki sauce over them. Marinate for at least 30 minutes.
- 3. Heat vegetable oil in a pan over medium-high heat. Remove salmon from the marinade and sear in the hot pan for 2-3 minutes on each side, or until golden brown.
- 4. Pour the remaining teriyaki sauce and prawns into the pan and simmer until the sauce thickens and coats the salmon.



Gorgeous chunky air fried chips served with poached salmon which took 2 minutes in the microwave, tin of mushy peas @harryramsden and homemade tartar sauce. Which is basically chopped up capers, mayonnaise and a splash of lemon juice. Have a good day.

## FAIRTRADE NEWS November 2024



Some time ago when I was consumed by a particular worry I decided that I needed to partition my thoughts and put my anxiety inside a metaphorical barrier. I could 'visit' my worry, but not let it envelope me. Recently I've reinstated this idea, this time with my three abiding obsessive worries: Gaza, the US election, the climate. When I do consider them, the appalling outcome is that none has any acceptable positive conclusion. Of course the advice is to concentrate on solving problems where one can.

Which brings me to chocolate, more specifically Fairtrade chocolate. I read recently that you've almost definitely eaten chocolate produced with child labour. 4 in 10 cocoa-growing households in Ivory Coast use child labour, 6 in 10 in Ghana. Ridiculously low levels of return on the production of cocoa mean that families have little choice but to use their children as labourers – wages are on average less than 2\$ a day and in fact net income is falling. In addition poor returns result in a cycle of deforestation to boost short term yields: tree yields start to decline after about 15 years. Ghana and Ivory Coast have lost 94% and 80% respectively of their forests – one third of it to cocoa production. 40% of Ivorian cocoa comes from protected forests – i.e. technically illegal.

And chocolate manufacturers, mostly vast international corporations earn stupendous profits. It is interesting and rather depressing to read the blurb produced by these manufacturers, some trumpeting their own ethical arrangements. The premium for Fairtrade certified chocolate is 3 times as high as that offered by the Rainforest Alliance.

As the season for advent calendars, chocolate coins and general chocolate indulgence approaches I urge you to seek out the Fairtrade mark. Farmers and their families and the environment will thank you!

Oxfam has lots of FT chocolate goodies. Some is available in (some) supermarkets and as ever I recommend Ethical Superstore.

## **Gardening Corner**

As I sit here writing this, the first named storm of the season is blowing well, and dropping copious amounts of water - as if we haven't had enough recently! I should think that by now, the underground water levels must be at the point of complete saturation. From the gardening point of view, activity outside has all but stopped and work on the ground is unlikely to happen any time soon. I have extoled the virtues of raised beds in the vegetable patch for many years. It is far too wet to even consider working these at present, but just two days dry makes all the difference, and I have a long list of jobs to do in the event that we ever do get back to back dry days again! Weeding will be the first job on the list followed by manuring and then covering the beds over with ground covering. This is porous, which lets air and water through, but stops weeds from growing back. The manure will get drawn down into the ground by the worms resulting in ideal conditions for planting the new crops when the covers are removed in the spring. With all the hedges cut, the next iob on the list will be the pruning of all our apple and pear trees. This will be only a light prune this year, as they were hit hard a couple of years ago in an effort to bring them back into a better shape and height. We are certainly missing the fruit this year, with just 12 conference pears and maybe around 50 various apples (not including the cookers) a real crop failure considering the number of trees that we have. There was plenty of blossom, so I can only think the one late frost we had last spring did all the damage. We especially missed the discovery apples – not one grew on the two well established trees. An old variety, but they normally provide us with the juiciest and most flavoursome apples in August/ September, well before the other varieties ripen.

So, with activity outside curtailed, it is all hands-on deck in the greenhouses and tunnels. Old crops are being removed and the ground is being cleared ready for the next crops to be planted. If we have enough manure, each bed will get a dressing applied as outside, but we never do ever have enough to go around. Apart from the one early frost, that fortunately did little damage, Autumn seems set to drag on for some considerable time this year. With the never ending wet or grey days, the biggest problem this year inside has been rank mildew and mould problems, the former on things like cucumbers, melons and courgettes, and the latter on the tomatoes. Our biggest tunnel grows a lot of food in a year, but at some 20 metres long and 7 metres wide it can suffer through lack of airflow. The ends have netting doors, which, when the wind is blowing allows some air circulation, but when there is little wind there is none at all, hence the problems. The cost of putting a decent size fan inside and then running it, would be quite high, so financially it might not be worth the expense. Instead, we try to rely on good housekeeping, like removing any fruits or leaves that show the first signs of mildew or mould, but even this has been a struggle to keep on top of. A job for this week is to remove the bulk of the tomatoes as many of these have finished. With most of


them removed, we are hoping that the plants that are still producing will get more air and so will carry on proving fruit for a little longer yet. The French beans have also finished now, but rather than pull them down straight away they will be left to dry off, and the seeds will be recovered and stored to provide next year's crop. The courgettes and various peppers are still hanging on in there, so they will be spared a little longer. We had a good crop of garlic and shallots this year, both of which were grown under cover in the big tunnel. This will be repeated again next year, but obviously in a different bed, to avoid disease problems. My next job will be to get both crops planted in individual pots, one whole shallot, and an individual garlic clove per pot. I could plant them straight into the ground, but I find that it is easier to manage them when in pots, especially when it comes to watering. They will then be planted out in the prepared bed in early spring, by which time they will be in active growth with good root development. With the cover and extra warmth provided in the tunnel, both crops will be ready for harvesting by the end of June, after which the beds will be cleared and then replanted, probably with a crop like calabrese, which can be fast growing and produce another crop in the Autumn. We are presently cutting some lovely fresh calabrese from an early July planting. There are various other activities underway, which will also feed into next year's plans both in the flower and vegetable beds. Strawberry runners have been removed and potted up, ready to replace some of the older plants. Strawberry plants are really at their best for two years, but certainly no more than 3. They should then be dug up and burnt, and replaced with new plants in a different area in order to avoid a build up of diseases. Sweet pea seed has been sown. We tend to grow one lot over winter, and then sow more in early spring in an effort to get a longer time cropping time. We have taken part delivery of a bulb / plant order, again ready for next year, and these have also been potted up, so that they can be planted out in spring.

We had a very rare 'day off' this month, which was not a busman's holiday for a change. The trip included both our daughters as well, but not their other halves and children, which is very unusual these days! They always arrive with their various broods, numerous cuddly toys, dog, wheelchair etc., but not this time. This was to be a special trip to Windsor Castle for just the four of us. We were greeted by armed police, who were extremely polite and friendly when asking Gemma to 'pop' her car boot and bonnet for a security inspection. This was a bit unexpected and they had to be pre-warned of the inevitable 'paraphernalia' in the boot, consisting of muddy boots, roller skates, knee and elbow pads, helmets etc., etc., Another grinned at the very fine collection of frocks and hatinators on display in the car as he said "you've got Prince William today"! Yes, their dreams had come true. I had been awarded an MBE in this year's King's birthday Honours list, for services to Forestry, and Prince William was presenting it to me. Needless to say, the girls (all three) were very pleased! It was all quite an experience. Everyone we met were extremely helpful and friendly, and William was extremely

personable. I won't repeat what he said when I told him I had recently retired from the Forestry Commission, after 45 years, that is between me and him. He thought that this was a very long time!! With William and Catherine at the helm, our Monarchy is in very safe hands, if only they are allowed.

Talking of monarchy (as in queen bees!), I did manage to grab a warm day to see to the bees a week or so ago. The varroa mite treatment was removed from each hive, queen excluders removed, mouse guards put on, and food supplies checked to ensure they were adequate for the cold months ahead. Fingers crossed that they will all survive for next year. On sunny days, the workers are clearly making the most of the ivy flowers, which are the last real nectar and pollen harvest for this year.

## **STARGAZING**



The seven stars of the Plough lie to the North in the evening. It is also known as the Great Bear or Ursa Major. Ursa Major was one of the constellations listed by the 2nd century AD Egyptian astronomer Ptolemy. The constellation of Ursa Major has been seen as a bear by many civilizations. In Greek mythology, Zeus, the king of the gods, fell in love with a young woman named Callisto. Hera, Zeus' jealous wife, transformed the beautiful Callisto into a bear and placed her in the heavens.

The cross of Cygnus is high in the western sky. The "W" of Cassiopeia lies nearly overhead in the Milky Way.

Mid-month the bright planet Jupiter is to the East in the evening sky. It lies to the left of the bright star Aldebaran. Slightly yellow Saturn can be seen to the South. The Gibbous Moon is close to Saturn on 10<sup>th</sup> November. Gibbous describes the Moon when it is in a phase that is between Full and half-illuminated. The nearly Full Moon is close to Jupiter on 17<sup>th</sup> November.

The Milky Way is a faint band of light visible on clear dark nights. It is the combined light of an enormous number of stars that make up our galaxy. There are approximately 200 billion galaxies in the Universe. Each galaxy contains very approximately 200 billion stars. So that's very approximately a mind-boggling 40,000,000,000,000,000,000,000 stars in the Universe!



## Shirenewton W.I.

Hearing how the secrets of the beautifully preserved Newport Medieval ship have been unravelled, was a truly inspiring experience! Dr. Toby Jones, curator of The Newport Medieval Ship Project, gave us a fascinating overview of the last twenty years work on this incredible find.



The ship was discovered in the Summer of 2002, during excavation work in preparation for building the Riverfront Arts Centre in Newport. The remains were found 7m deep and, after a number of unsuccessful attempts to raise her, as Newport has very high tides every 12 hours, the ship was taken apart piece by piece and was fully removed by December 2002. Only one skeleton was found,

actually underneath the ship. Carbon dating proved this to be from the Iron Age, a long time before the merchant ship arrived in Newport!

Investigating the ships' timbers proved very interesting, as all timbers were shown to be of the same age. The ship was made mainly of oak and was so well preserved, due to being so well tarred, that the archaeologists were able to walk on the planks with steel toe capped boots.

It was proved that the trees were felled at a forest in the Basque Country, between September 1457 and March 1458. This forest was 80 miles inland with the ship being built in the area of San Sebastian in Northern

Spain. None of the wood was sawn but was axed or adzed, with high quality workmanship throughout.

Further research showed, from everyday objects found at the excavation, that the ship was engaged in the wine trade, conveying casks of red wine. Computer modelling identified that the ship was carrying 175 tons of wine which equates to around 225,000 bottles!

Interestingly, everything found on the ship came from the areas of Lisbon and the Algarve, the ship being Portuguese owned and crewed. The wine was transported along the Lisbon to Bristol trade route, taking 2-3 weeks via the Bay of Biscay, before the ship left Bristol and sailed to Newport for repairs. She sailed into Newport sometime after the Summer of 1468 and before the Winter of 1469 and was placed on a cradle. However, the cradle collapsed and the ship fell over onto its side, where it sank into the anoxic river sediment which helped to preserve the timbers.

After removal all timbers were cleaned of tar, barnacles etc., with painstaking cleaning using toothbrushes in part, which took many years. Toby had brought pieces of wood from the ship, one of which had been left to dry out in the sun and had begun to crumble, while another, which had been cleaned and preserved was as solid as the day it was cut. We also handled the iron nails and oak nails used, over 99% of the iron nails had disintegrated but the oak nails were in amazingly good condition. In the scarf joint at the keel of the ship, a silver petit blanc coin was found, minted between May and July 1447. It was traditional to place a coin in this position and have it blessed to protect the ship, as it was also believed that a cargo ship that had no money, doomed its owners to failure!

Historically, at the end of the Hundred Years War, England lost control of Gascony, with wine supplies being cut off. It is believed that the Portuguese saw a great economic opportunity here and commissioned the Basques to build this huge ship in the mid-1450s, gaining a hugely lucrative wine trade. There also seems to be a possible link to a letter written by Richard Neville, 16<sup>th</sup> Earl of Warwick, dated November 1469, regarding payment for repairs of his "ship in Newport". The ship arrived at Newport around the time the letter was written so could well be the very ship!

At the present time all timbers have been recorded, cleaned and preserved and are in storage waiting to be rebuilt although, where and how to rebuild are difficult questions to answer. A new museum is needed so that this incredible, totally unique example of Medieval workmanship can be displayed for all to see.

The ship's timbers and many artifacts found during the excavation are housed at Queensway Meadows Industrial Estate in Newport. Guided tours take place on Fridays and Saturdays between Easter and November.

Good Lord (are we allowed to say that in a Parish Magazine?), I feel old. Excel, the spreadsheet, is in its  $40^{th}$  year! How did that happen? I can remember working with Lotus 1-2-3 on my Amstrad 1512 twin floppy (5  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch) DOS machine doing a Monte Carlo simulation as part of my MBA. The simulation took, as I recall, about 14 hours to calculate.

This would have been in 1987/1988. Mr Google tells me that the Amstrad 1512 was 'from' £466 (£399+VAT) when first launched in 1986. That is the equivalent of over £1,700 in today's money. Compare with my latest Lenovo ThinkPad laptop which came in at £900 (incl VAT) with a 500GB SSD disk and more computing power than I'll ever need! I imagine it would knock out the Monte Carlo simulation in a few seconds. As for storage, the storage capacity of the 5.25 inch floppy was 360KB, then 720KB and then a mighty 1.2MB for a high density disk!! Even my phone has 256GB.

This progression is a classic example of Moore's law which, in 1965, was the prediction that that the number of transistors in an integrated circuit would double approximately every couple of years. It has morphed into a general understanding that the pace of technological advancement would only accelerate. If the history of computing, and especially the technology which underlies it, is of interest. I can recommend 'Chip War' by Chris Miller. Written in 2022 it's one of the books I read on holiday and, yes it has some technology in it, but it's more focused on the geopolitical aspects and the competitive advantage leadership in this area bestows. You can pick up the book for under a tenner (delivered) on eBay. It's well worth a read.

Excel, of course raced past the established Lotus 1-2-3 to become the de facto standard spreadsheet in companies and therefore the world. Now as part of the Microsoft 365 (before that the Office Suite) it's use is still ubiquitous, and I still use it! I also use the online Google Sheets offering for simple stuff (mainly lists) but you can't beat Excel on the desktop for the 'more interesting' stuff.

But talking, as we were, of mobile phones ....

As I have repeatedly emphasised, your mobile phone is increasingly important in all aspects of life, especially for digital banking and two factor authentication for logging onto many sites. It was, therefore, with great trepidation I decided to upgrade my mobile phone. This was a surprisingly easy experience as my new phone was able to 'clone itself' based on my old phone using the Clone Phone app which came pre-installed on my Android phones – however, it's not

pre-installed on all phones but can be downloaded from the Play Store and App Store.

That bit is easy, all my apps, data, phones, txts, call history, transferred easily. The only 'wriggle' was the sync between WhatsApp on my phone and PC. The PC app didn't seem to like the new phone and I wasn't getting a duplication of messages. A brief search suggested I'd need to log-out of the PC app and log back in. Simple enough. That, and deleting WhatsApp from the old phone seems to have worked a treat.

The less fun side of this was the tedious task of validating and logging back into the many apps on the phone. All the banking apps, car parking payment apps, social media apps, remote monitoring apps, etc. Many require two factor authentication and some via the authenticator apps which are installed on the phone! This is where it is very useful to have your old phone to hand as the first thing you need is the authenticator apps and you need to authenticate them. I'm sure there is a work around if your phone is stolen and you don't have access to the authenticator apps, but it would be more painful and even more tedious. Therefore, guard your phone and don't lose it!

But, in summary, a surprisingly smooth transition and not nearly as bad as I feared.

As we head towards Christmas and people are looking to purchase gifts, so the scammers ramp up their efforts to part you from your hard earnt cash.

The Times had an interesting article in early October entitled 'Seven Facebook Marketplace scams to watch out for'. It covers: Fake payment confirmations; Counterfeit currency; Rental scams; Stolen goods; Attempts to steal your data; The scammer tells you they'll send a courier to collect the item; and, Faulty or damaged items. Most of these are self-explanatory. The article then suggests a number of 'red flags' which suggest someone may be trying to scam you. These are: It seems too good to be true; Pressure tactics; Unusual payment methods; Incomplete profiles or suspicious locations; and, Refusing to meet face-to-face.

Sky news reports on a TSB finding that approximately 1/3 of all Facebook marketplace ads were scams with users losing around £60million every year. Remember, they are out to get you.

Finally, coming full circle back to chips. It's just been reported that Nvidia has overtaken Apple as world's most valuable company. Googles AI overview response to a question asking it summarise

what Nvidia does is: *NVIDIA* is a company that designs and sells GPUs and other chip systems for a variety of uses, including gaming, cryptocurrency mining, and artificial intelligence (AI). Nvidia is a company featured in the aforementioned book, 'Chip War' by Chris Miller. There you can read about how and why it managed to overtake more established chip makers such as Intel.

On that happy note, safe browsing.
